Dear Scappoose School District Family,

New Oregon Health Education Standards and Performance Indicators for Grades K-12 were adopted in December 2016. Health Education Standards help define the knowledge and skills students will need throughout their K-12 experience. Standards also provide consistency in what is taught to students across our state to ensure equity in education. Health-literate people are able to obtain and apply knowledge and skills to enhance their own health and the health of others — both now and in the future as their needs change throughout their lives.

The Scappoose School District has implemented a health curriculum this year for Grades K-6 titled, "The Great Body Shop" to meet these standards. In addition, attached for reference is the location of potentially sensitive topics by grade within this curriculum that your child may be introduced to for the first time. Many topics are new and may look different for you and your family. In past years, boys and girls were separated and taught topics pertaining to their gender only, but now all students will be taught the same information, regardless of gender. Research shows that by educating students sooner on some of these topics, we can help reduce the risk of risky behaviors later.

Per our Board policy, IGAI (Human Sexuality, AIDS/HIV, Sexually Transmitted Diseases, Health Education) the district shall provide an age-appropriate, comprehensive plan of instruction focusing on human sexuality, HIV/AIDS, and other sexually transmitted infections, and disease prevention in elementary and secondary schools as an integral part of health education. Course material and instruction for all human sexuality education courses shall enhance a student's understanding of sexuality as a normal and healthy aspect of human development. A part of the comprehensive plan of instruction shall provide age-appropriate child sexual abuse prevention instruction for students in kindergarten through grade 12. In addition, the HIV/AIDS and other sexually transmitted infections and disease prevention education will be part of the human sexuality education comprehensive plan. Any parent may request that his/her child be excused from these portions of the instructional program under the procedures set forth in Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 336.035(2). If you would like to excuse your child from any particular lessons, please fill out the portion below and return it to your child's teacher as soon as possible. If you would like to review any components of the health materials or have specific concerns or questions, please contact your school principal. We are grateful for your partnership as we work together to help our students grow into healthy adults.
